Visti from Uganda – from the "forgotten Continent of the future"?



Anne Namuddu Motherhouse in Masaka, accompanied by her one-year-old son Johannes and Betty, will be making many visits to organizations, church communities and friends in Baden-Württemberg who support her project. For one night and one day, they were able to recover from the stresses and strains of their journey in Warmbronn. They will be back in Warmbronn from July 21 to 25 and will be organizing an information evening together with us and the local Protestant parish in the Baptist-Johannes-Church.

There is always a bit of adventure on a trip from Uganda to Germany - damage to the plane in Entebbe, forcing us to get off the plane again, boarding passes not printed out for the connecting flight from Istanbul to Stuttgart, resulting in a missed flight in Istanbul for some of the travel group. But in the end, we were able to happily welcome everyone, i.e. Teddy with her little Johannes, Betty, George and Henry, at Stuttgart Airport in "two batches". Their visit program for two months is extensive. While George and Henry will be doing a lot of work at and with German cooperation partners in terms of solar technology, Teddy Nakanwagi, the director of the

And, as a firm promise, he will always be happy to come back to Warmbronn.

Bothlale and Robin are among the best in their class and scored in the top range. End of the school year in the Infinity project

The ongoing war in Israel/Palestine has given rise to many concerns as to whether projects that we sustainably support, such as the Infinity Learning and Excellence Program for children and young people with Ethiopian roots in Jerusalem, can continue. We have been funding the Jerusalem Foundation's program in cooperation with the City of Jerusalem and the Hebrew University for four years now. The fear that the war, with all its terrible effects on the population in Israel, could prevent the children and their families who had fled Ethiopia from continuing to take part, thankfully did not prove to be true. We have now received the following encouraging information from the project leaders:

"Despite a difficult year, in which the school year started later due to the war and many student chaperones were drafted into the army, there was excellent participation from the young people and supportive and enthusiastic parents. The young people responded particularly well to the learning opportunities, but also to the lectures and courses in this school year"



In places where a lack of infrastructure is a much bigger everyday problem, digital offerings, in particular sufficient access to the internet, are an essential part of providing educational and therefore professional opportunities. Volker Ebert and his friends from the Education for Tanzania association https://bifta.de are therefore



"All Fritzboxes have arrived at the schools and I have transferred the Internet fees for the first 3 months. (..). Before sending them out, we had each school principal name a contact person who would then receive the devices and put them into operation. Our own IT specialist Max completely configured the 9 Fritzboxes (and plugged in a USB memory that already contains 22 educational films with subtitles in Swahili), Max also made a really good 30-minute film as an installation aid. Then the devices were shipped by air freight to their destination, which took another 3 weeks"

Maqamat: A New Hope (Tikva Hadashah in Hebrew, Amal Jadid in Arabic) is a Jewish-Arabic ensemble of teachers and musicians from the Maqamat School of Eastern Music in Safed, Israel. Nissim Lugasi, Dr. Wassim Odeh and Niri Sade together with their students Avishag Neriya, Adam Chichportich and Amitai Ezroni play old melodies from Persia, sounds of the Arabic oud and classical Turkish-Ottoman music with Moroccan elements. Their performance is an exotic musical journey across geographical, temporal and religious borders. It reflects an Eastern Jewish music that bridges the vibrant spaces of the Silk Road in Central Asia while complementing other indigenous genres of Maqam music that stretch from the Middle East to as far west as Andalusia. Unique arrangements, re-linked melodies and enlightening lyrics create a musical foundation for a new seed of hope and creative partnership.

The artists:

Nissim Lugasi - Persian Singing and Tar - Nissim Lugasi is a singer and Persian Tar player who has been researching, performing and teaching classical Persian and Ottoman-Turkish singing for 25 years and is recognized as one of the leading experts in this field in Israel. He has collaborated with major artists from around the world and has performed extensively in Israel and abroad. Nissim is the pedagogical director of the Maqamat School of Eastern Music.

Dr. Wassim Odeh - Arabic Oud - Wassim is a Palestinian oud virtuoso and composer, inspired by the classical Arabic musical heritage of Oum Kulthum and Mohammed Abdul Wahab. He has recently released his third album Moshaghbeen. Odeh has won international awards for performance and composition and has collaborated with Simon Shaheen, the London Symphony Orchestra and Radiohead. Dr. Odeh heads the Arabic Music Department at the Maqamat School of Eastern Music.

Niri Sadeh - Turkish ney and vocals - Niri is one of the pioneers of the Turkish ney (reed flute) in Israel. Niri has been a singer, composer, arranger and recording artist for 20 years and is the head of the Turkish music department at the Maqamat School of Eastern Music.

Avishag Neriya - Viola - Avishag is a versatile violist with a deep connection to Middle Eastern music influenced by her Ethiopian roots. After ten years of classical music training, she spent three years exploring all Middle Eastern music styles at the Maqamat School of Eastern Music. She performs with the Israeli Andalusian Orchestra. Avishag graduated from Maqamat in 2023.

Adam Shishporteesh - Turkish Lavta - Adam is a composer and Turkish lavta player who studied jazz and composition before immersing himself in the world of maqam and microtonal music. He currently plays his original compositions with his own ensemble and will soon release a new solo album. He graduated from the Maqamat School of Eastern Music in 2023.

Amitai Ezroni - Percussion - Amitai specializes in percussion instruments from various musical traditions and has performed in national and international concerts. He is already considered one of the best percussionists of the new generation in Israel. Amitai studied at the Maqamat School of Eastern Music under the guidance of percussion master Yshai Afterman and graduated in 2024ss.
